National Homeless Youth Awareness Month

"In 2021, the Senate designated November to be Youth Homelessness Awareness Month. Since then, every November we bring together our whole community to confront this crisis head-on. We urge everyone to get loud, act, and shed light on the issue of youth homelessness." Covenant House is the largest, primarily privately funded charity in North and Central America providing immediate and longterm support for young people facing homelessness and survivors of trafficking.





November has been a time

to acknowledge those children and families experiencing homelessness since 2021. As many as 2.5 million youth per year experience homelessness. Along with losing their home, community, friends, and routines as well as their sense of stability and safety, many homeless youths are also victims of trauma. While trying to survive on the streets, youth are exposed to countless dangers, with an increased likelihood of substance abuse, early parenthood, impulsivity, depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, and a vulnerability to being trafficked.

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The cornerstone of The Rockford Housing Authority is "A Quality Home Is The Foundation Of Society & Community" and we stand by that not only in November, but every day for the past 71 years. Within those years we have grown and adapted to the ever-changing world of public housing adding programs, initiatives, and incentives to make sure the people of Rockford have access to the fundamental right to have a home.

With those programs and initiatives, we strive for our residents and their families to not settle for public housing resources, but to break the glass ceiling of the housing market. We build in programs to not only get residents off the streets, but to also create life long goals and investments in their home, career, and overall life.

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One of those programs is the Housing Choice Voucher Program. In the Greater Rockford Area, low-income individuals and families use vouchers to help pay for privately owned housing, which has historically been referenced, and commonly known as 'Section 8 Housing.' Unfortunately, today, many of us have fallen victim to erroneous information without questioning its accuracy or scrutinizing the motives and reliability of the sources.

Misunderstanding, misinformation, and a slew

of false or content inaccuracies have provided disinformation to people who simply want to navigate the real opportunities that the Housing Choice Voucher Program provides. The underlining purpose of the HCV program is to provide rental assistance to eligible individuals and families. The rules and regulations of the HCV program are determined by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, commonly referred to as HUD. The Rockford Housing Authority, like all the other Public Housing Authorities throughout the US, is afforded choices in the operation of the program, which is included in the RHA's administrative plan, a document approved by the RHA Board of Commissioners of the municipality. When an individual or a family is determined to be eligible for program participation and funding is available, the RHA issues a housing voucher to that person or head of household.

RHA Public housing comes in all sizes and types, from scattered single-family houses to Highrise apartments for Seniors and elderly families. The RHA owns 291 Scattered Site units throughout the City of Rockford. These residences are divided into 2 sections with The Rock River as the dividing point – Scattered Sites East and Scattered Sites West.



The units are single family or duplex residences blended into the surrounding community. Transfers from a development to a Scattered Site unit have specific requirements based upon "good tenancy".

Bringing us to the FSS Home Ownership Program; FSS makes it possible for participants to accumulate substantial sums of money; therefore, giving the family a down payment on a home of their own if they choose that option. Presently we have 175 families in the program with a capacity of 210. The program can be a very good experience for families that are transitioning into the home buying market or families that have the desire to gain employment or education to improve their living options. An incentive of the FSS program is an escrow (savings) account.



As the family rent increases due to increased earned income (30% of adjusted gross income), the increase of rent is deposited in an escrow account that they may access once

their goals are completed. FSS is a wonderful program that is making a difference for those that are successful in achieving their goals. Participants have been able to obtain GED or higher education. Employment and training has become a priority. The desire to move on from housing becomes evident as goals are obtained. Three families have started their own business and a few have sent their children to college or gone back to school themselves.

Veteran's Day
